
Extended Diploma (ED's) and Foundation Diploma (Foundations)


- Katie Holmes

- The ED has around 150 students across 2 x years.
- Over 15 years teaching across a Variety of different art & design courses inc. A level, ED, level 2, Foundation & as a moderator.
- I originally trained as a graphic designer.





Extended Diploma's are:

- Full time courses
- 2 x years
- Equivalent to 3 x A levels
- Preparation for progression
- Recognised by Universities
- Allow for specialisation at 16 (vocational)*
- Fully funded if under 19yrs
- *I'll come back to this later



Who is ED's for?

The course is for students who wish to progress to a career in in the creative sector.

Extended diploma's cater for two types of applicants:

- Those who know which specific area of art and design they are interested in.
- Those who know they want to work in the creative sector but have yet to discover which specific aspect of art and design they are interested in.
- Applicants are normally GCSE leavers or those who have started A levels or an equivalent and want to change course.



Names & Awarding Bodies


- Extended diplomas are delivered at a variety of different centres including but not limited to Academies, 6th Forms, general FE colleges and at universities across Yorkshire.
- There are a few awarding bodies:
 E.g. BTECs, Edexcel, Pearson, UAL (University or Arts London)
 N.B not all have the prefix BTEC (e.g. UAL Extended Diploma)
- Courses can be general, specialist or general then specialist (have specialist pathways or specialist options within briefs).




Leeds Arts University (LAU) example: UAL Extended Diploma in Creative practice: Art, design and communication.

Structure example:

Regardless of name/area the course tend to start with underpinning skills then introduce more specialist teaching.

Stage 1 – Diagnostic

This is where we embed general art and design skills and give students a taster of many areas of art and design or the potential of their specialism.

Normally comprising of introductions to:

 Workshops (3D, print), Drawing techniques, Photography, Digital/time based media, Colour (paint and mixed media), 2D/3D Design/visual studies, Contextual studies


Stage 2 – Specialism

Students are supported to choose a specialist area and begin to focus their subject specialist skills in either: Fine Art, Fashion Textiles, 3D, Graphic Communication Preparation of a portfolio for progression.

Assessment Models

- Normally coursework based
- Grade determined by a final major project / final externally set project.
- In some centres, the final project is marked externally in others it is marked internally and moderated externally.
- In some centers, the final project may be completed in timed exam type conditions.
- At the end students receive a grade which is equivalent to 3 x A Levels



LAU example: A series of units which are assessed at pass then a final unit which is coursework based over around 8 x weeks.

It is internally set and externally moderated.

Awarded P, M, or D. (D is equivalent to $3 \times A^*$ at A level).




Entry Requirements

- Centre's tend to ask for around
 4 x GCSE at grade 4 or above or equivalent.
- Not all require English & Math's.
- Not all require an art qualification.
- Portfolio/Interview (?).
- AS ALWAYS CHECK WITH THE CENTRE!



LAU example: 4 x GCSE equivalents, must include English & Math's Does not need to include Art or creative subject but application includes 6 x slide/image portfolio and personal statement. No interview.



Why choose an ED over other options?


- Specialising earlier than A levels
- Develops a large portfolio
- More time developing own practice and finding individual area of interest
- Scaffolded preparation for progression into next steps
- Bridges school and progression options (fills in gaps)
- Personal development in wider employability skills fostered.
- Allow for further exploration of possible specialisms
- Taught to think.




Cont.

- Not a 'school' environment
- Links to live briefs, simulated work experience and possibly alumni.
- Coursework assessment allows for progressive development of skills rather than exams.
- More formative assessment opportunities.
- Generates UCAS points that can be used to apply outside of subject area.
- Is recognised by universities in the creative sector.








Considerations:

Foundation Diploma's are:


- Full time course
- 1 x year
- Preparation for progression courses
- Post ED/A level
- Allow for further exploration of specialization
- Portfolio development
- Fully funded if under 19yrs



Foundation:

- Normally after A levels (was expected)
- Portfolio generation
- Explorative and formative
- Longer on skills
- Helps decide/identify specialism
- Longer in education
- Builds UCAS points
- NOT a foundation degree
- Can be a year 0
- Free (U19)
