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# Getting here by public transport, bike, walking or by car

# **Parking information**

We have been allocated Shearbridge Car Park for the conference which is P3 on the map (see p4). Student ambassadors will be available to support with getting you to Richmond Reception.

### **Roadworks**

To help plan your journey into the city and to see the latest traffic news and road closures visit the <u>Bradford Future</u> website. Please note, pedestrian access will be maintained at all times on the path nearest to the Richmond building entrance where staff will be waiting for you.

# By public transport

There are two railway stations and a bus station within walking distance of the University campus. Bradford Interchange, which has a bus and train station, is 15 minutes away by foot. Forster Square railway station is about a 25 minute walk away.

It takes around 15 minutes to walk from the city centre, though it is partly uphill. From Bradford Interchange walk down the hill towards City Hall, then turn left past City Hall. From Forster Square station, walk past the "Fibres" sculpture onto Cheapside, then along Market Street towards City Hall. Walk through Centenary Square and City Park and continue towards the Alhambra Theatre. Turn right up Great Horton

Road just before the Alhambra, and the University's City Campus is about 300

metres up this hill just beyond the College.

To get the bus to University of Bradford campus from Bradford Interchange, take the 576 Bradford-Halifax bus, which leaves at regular intervals and takes around 5 minutes.

If you're coming from further afield by bus or by train, you can plan your journey using the WY Metro journey planner.

## By foot or bike

The University of Bradford Campus is a 15 minute walk or a 7 minute cycle away from the city centre. From Centenary Square and City Park, continue towards the Alhambra Theatre. Turn right up Great Horton Road just before the Alhambra. The Campus is 300 metres up this hill, just beyond Bradford College. There are showers and a secure cycle store. To access these facilities, visit the main reception in the Richmond Building on arrival.

## By car

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Bradford is connected to the national motorway network via the M62 and M606. If you are travelling from the south, east or west of Bradford, you will probably find it most convenient to use the M62 and M606. If you are arriving from the north-west you will probably use the A629/A650 via Skipton and Keighley. From the north-east it is most convenient to use the A1 or A19, and reach Bradford via A59 and then A658 south of Harrogate. Many road signs on major routes into the city have the route to the University indicated by a mortarboard symbol.

# For those arriving by car

Please report to Shearbridge Car Park, which is P3 on the map below. Student ambassadors will be available to support you to Richmond Reception.

# For those arriving by foot


Please report to Richmond building main entrance (see image on right) on Richmond Road (and not side entrance on Horton Road) where staff will be waiting for you.

If you arrive outside of the morning arrival window (as an attendee or speaker/ student panel who are joining us later in the day), please ask at Richmond reception for directions to Horton D.

# Marketplace staff

Please report to Student Central and make your way to Level -2 and the Below One area where the stalls are located. If you access Student Central using the main entrance, you may find it helpful to ask for directions at J B Priestley Library reception. There is a lift available just around the corner from the stairs so do use these to ensure your safety as you will be carrying a banner stand or a tablecloth and resources etc. to set up your stall. To exit Student Central, make your way to Level 0.





### Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi will be available on the day. Guests will need to text a code to a number and it will give you a username and password to log into eduroam. Printed copies of this will be available on the day. Note, we are not able to share this code in advance as it is for use on the day only.

# **Accessibility**
